





From the Manse

If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land. (2 Chronicles 7.14)

Many of you will be aware of the recent decision of the General Assembly in response

to the report of the Special Commission on Same-Sex Relationships and the Ministry. The 'trajectory' chosen is believed by many to be contrary to the clear teaching of Scripture, many are deeply disturbed and disappointed by the decisions. I count myself amongst them.

The Church of Scotland faces a difficult time ahead as many members and Ministers reflect on whether they are able to remain in a denomination which is marginalising the place of the Bible in the life and practice of the church, and if they do remain how do they express their views. During the debate one commissioner remarked "the bible says but we now know better".

Indeed this decision by the church is a symptom of a deeper concern about the place of the bible in the life of the Church of Scotland. Historically the C of S has "affirmed the Scriptures as its supreme rule of faith and life" the decision at the General Assembly is a clear departure from that affirmation.

A Theological Commission has been set up (their remit is below) and they will meet over two days each month for two years. I have called the church to pray for the work of the commission and those who have been called to serve on it. Dr Jane McArthur, known to many of you, is a member of the commission. Details of prayer meetings are below.

We cannot be ostriches and stick our heads in the sand, whatever happens in 2013 will have an effect on every congregation within the Church of Scotland. If anyone would like to talk to me further about this matter please do not hesitate to contact me.

The deliverance that was passed and the task of the Theological Commission:

Resolve to consider further the lifting of the moratorium on the acceptance for training and ordination of persons in a same-sex relationship, and to that end instruct the Theological Commission to prepare a report for the General Assembly of 2013 containing:

- (i) a theological discussion of issues around same-sex relationships, civil partnerships and marriage;
- (ii) an examination of whether, if the Church were to allow its ministers freedom of conscience in deciding whether to bless same-sex relationships involving life-long commitments, the recognition of such lifelong relationships should take the form of a blessing of a civil partnership or should involve a liturgy to recognise and celebrate commitments which the parties enter into in a Church service in addition to the civil partnership, and if so to recommend liturgy therefore;
- (iii) an examination of whether persons, who have entered into a civil partnership and have made lifelong commitments in a Church ceremony, should be eligible for admission for training, ordination and induction as ministers of Word and Sacrament or deacons in the context that no member of Presbytery will be required to take part in such ordination or induction against his or her conscience; and to report to the General Assembly of 2013.



Introducing the new Medical Director

Dr Ruth Shakespeare has been appointed by the World Mission Council of the Church of Scotland and approved by Blantyre Synod of the Central Church of Africa Presbyterian to work here at MMH. She arrived on 3rd June.

Ruth was brought up in a Christian family and studied medicine in London. After further training in paediatrics she worked in a remote mission hospital in South Africa. There she came to understand the importance of public health and preventive medicine, and when she returned to the UK undertook a further five years training in public health.

She then went back to Africa, this time to work in Zimbabwe where she was responsible for communicable disease control and HIV programmes in the province of Manicaland. For the last ten years she has worked in prison health in the UK. Recently she has spent time with the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh, and studied mission at the International Christian College in Glasgow. She is very happy to have the opportunity to serve again in Africa.

We are very excited as Mulanje Mission community as a whole to receive Dr. Shakespeare after almost a year without a medical director. We almost lost hope that someone would come to head the hospital after Dr. Roland van de Ven left for Tanzania so you can imagine how happy we are that finally we have a medical director. She has come at the right time when as a hospital we are plagued by a number of crucial problems like diminishing donor funding and shortage of medical supplies among others and we are optimistic that with her leadership things will turn round for the better.

Her arrival coincided with MMH being presented with the prestigious infection prevention excellence award, we could not have thought of any better way of welcoming Dr. Shakespeare than the colorful ceremony which was full of celebration and interaction.

We wish Dr. Shakespeare a wonderful stay at MMH. Takulandilani adokotala.

A call to sponsor a hospital bed at Mulanje Mission Hospital

We are utterly dependent on our donor partners - individuals, church partners and development organizations throughout the world, for more than 50% of the running costs of this hospital. Your contribution is vital. Drug costs are rising all the time and nearly our entire budget for essential medicines and clinical supplies comes from donations. Most of the energy of our senior management team is spent on raising funds to keep the doors open and running the hospital as economically as we can without compromising patient care.

We have an agreement with government to cover the costs of essential maternal and child health services for our local population. All other patients are charged user fees, but patient fees cannot possibly cover all the costs of care here in Malawi. If we were to charge fees at normal rates most patients would not be able to afford health services. As a Christian hospital, those in need of medical treatment, but with no means to pay, are never turned away.

We are relaunching this programme in July 2011 to reflect the real costs of providing inpatient care. US\$1000 pays for one hospital bed to provide care for up to 40 patients during the whole year. But any contribution you can offer will make a difference and can save lives.
