Having been called to preach every Sunday from the start of June I have had an opportunity to study again God's promises to Abraham as written in the book of Genesis.

It has been interesting as well encouraging to look again at how the God's promise that through Abraham a great nation would be created, it was complex and to human understanding it seemed impossible that God's plans would ever be achieved.

But in these times of great uncertainty in the world in which we live, it is reassuring to know that God is in control and that his ways are not our ways, nothing absolutely nothing is too difficult for him.

Who would have believed that Abraham and Sarah, who was well beyond child bearing age, would conceive a child, it is laughable! Their son Isaac God then asked to be sacrificed to prove Abraham's trust in Him, his only son was spared and went on to marry and have his own children.

But why did God chose Jacob, the younger of Isaac and Rebecca's twin boys, especially when he, with the co-operation of his mum who favoured him, deceived his father into giving him the birth right due to his elder brother Esau.

Jacob, estranged from his brother for twenty years, never seeing his mother again having had to flee to his uncle's to escape his brother's death threat. Being cheated by his uncle for the one whose hand he longed for in marriage eventually to return winning God's favour and reconciling his differences with his brother.

One would have thought, Jacob would have realised that favouring one child over another was not healthy for a good family relationship, But he showed favour to Joseph, his first born son to Rachel, the one he longed for in marriage. Joseph sold by his brothers into slavery was to save God's chosen people from starvation when he rose to second command in Egypt during the seven years of famine, all part of God's promise to Abraham all these years before.

The family settled in Egypt to return to the Promised Land, as a great and powerful nation, with God working through Moses.

God does indeed work in mysterious ways, trust in Him always.

We had a really great visit from the 20 children and 2 interpreters who were based in our halls for weekdays for 4 weeks in May/June. As well as the usual visits to the dentist and specsavers we had

some really great trips to Edinburgh Climbing Centre, Xtreme Go-Karting, Scotland's Theme Park, Dynamic Earth, Edinburgh Castle, Jupiter Artland, Beecraigs, Hopetoun House, 4 schools, fire station, time capsule, Broxburn swimming pool, Xtreme combat, Edinburgh Castle, Kingsfield Golf Range, Drumshoreland Cadets, Safari Park, beach and 10 pin bowling as well as some nice days based in our halls doing crafts, music etc and practising for our Thank you concert. The great thing about all these activities is that the children are improving their health, while having fun in uncontaminated conditions.

Some of the highlights of the visit were:

Our newest girl Anya, who stayed with Heather and Gavin Kyle in Broxburn, settling in very quickly and being such a great and happy addition to the group.

Continued progress with Palina. When we first met Palina she was a very shy, frightened, introverted looking girl who did not speak. Now in just over one year she is a really beautiful happy girl and was great and confident in our thank you concert.

Continued progress with Denis, a favourite of many, not only in the congregation. He celebrated his 11th birthday while he was with us and had another great visit with us. He is a much better behaved boy than before and is probably the most loving child in the group. Its not difficult to see why he is many peoples favourite when you meet him.

It was also a happy and sad visit too. Happy that we could

celebrate the 5th visit from our older children but sad that after 5 years with us we have to say goodbye to them for the last time. Its great to see the difference we make to the children over 1 visit but its even better to see the cumulative effect 5 visits has. It was so nice in our Thank You concert to look back to when these children joined us as small, thin, shy 7 year olds and compare that to the healthier much more confident 11/12 year olds they have turned out to be. It has been a real pleasure to add some value to their journey through life.

Central to everything we do during the month the children are with us is our base at our church halls. We can't thank everyone enough for letting us use the church halls to carry out the great work that our very special team of host parents and helpers do. We often receive comments about how welcoming our halls are and also any members of the congregation we meet. Thank you so much for that.

We do not rest on our laurels though and our plans for the next visit in 2015 are already well underway. At this early stage we have already signed up 4 new host families to replace some of the ones who have completed their 5 years and decided not to take a new child. Its very exciting to know that we will be looking for 7/8 new children to top our numbers back up to 20 again for next year. That's 7/8 new children and families that will start to feel the helping hand of God on their lives through the work of his people in our group. The people in these remote villages often say that the world has forgotten about them. With Gods help and your help we will not allow that happen.

The vacancy has been advertised in all Church of Scotland publications which go out to ministers, and in September's edition of Life and Work. I can tell you that we have already

had some interest in the position. The committee are currently reviewing this interest and look forward to receiving more once the advert in Life and Work is circulated.

In summary, work is progressing well and we are encouraged by the input from the congregation and by some of the interest we have had already. I would ask that you keep the work of the committee in your prayers and assure you that we will work diligently, responsibly, and in faith that we will find our next minister in accordance with the Lord.

Treasurer's Update

It's hard to believe that we're almost two-thirds of the way through 2014 already. And with almost six months into this vacancy it's worth taking a closer look at our finances.

As at the end of July our total income reached £57,541.19, with our expenditure over the same period being slightly higher at £58,494.51. These income figures have, however, been boosted by monies transferred from our Fabric Fund. I arranged a £6,000 transfer in January to pay for the new boiler, and a further £4,000 transfer at the end of April to cover the costs of other various fabric projects, (including the new path at the front of the Church) arranged by the Property Committee. And with necessary maintenance work due to be carried out on our steeple, I will need to arrange a further transfer of funds to pay for that when the time comes.

We're now almost through our 'leaner months' when our regular income drops during the holiday period, and doesn't quite cover our ongoing regular monthly costs. We have, however, had our tax reclaim on gift aid contributions to help bridge the gap. These quarterly tax reclaims provide a very useful source of income, allowing us to reclaim tax on all gift aid contributions made and on any gift day contributions which authorise us to reclaim gift aid. Following a change in tax laws last year we can also now reclaim some tax relief on small donations (ie less than £50) made via the open plate. This year so far we've already received more than £7,800 via tax reclaims.

All in all, our finances are still in a healthy position thanks to the contributions you continue to make. If anyone is interested in making gift aid contributions, please speak to Jean Weir.
