

From the Manse

I hope to find you well. I can hardly believe it has been three months since the last church magazine. And here we are in August 2015. Strictly speaking the summer is gone and the extended holiday season is a thing of the past. To some this is good news: things can return to normal. To others the mere thought of going back to school or following a work routine is met with a sigh! Maybe you are somewhere in between. Neither

glad nor sad. Perhaps because the changes of seasons and routines do not impact you that much. Which brings me to the matter of CHANGE!

Shortly the change of the season will be announced with leaves turning yellow, brown, red and purple. All of this signalling the inevitable: CHANGE! Only six letters long but a word that can impact on your very being. How do you feel when you read or hear the word? Are you energised or drained by change? I read something interesting and inspirational that I want to share on the topic.

Living systems that do not undergo change are by definition dead. The human body is a good point in case. It is general knowledge that we are composed of trillions of cells. What is not common knowledge is that these cells are all fairly young no matter how old we are! Even when you have reached an age of sixty, seventy or even eighty the majority of cells in your body is less than a decade (ten years!) old. Some of the cells in our bodies have a life expectancy of only a few days while some of the oldest cells – muscle cells – can be 15 years old. The moral of the story: WE WERE CREATED FOR CHANGE!

The Bible has quite a bit to say about life and being human. Psalm 139 for example sings about the greatness of the Creator while Psalm 8 reflects on our position in creation. Life and how we live it are very important themes in the Bible. Often we are reminded that life is a process or journey. We are forever on the move.

No one of us know what the next three months may bring. It may require us to adapt to changes on different levels. Personal circumstances may necessitate dramatic changes in your life. Do not despair. Do not collapse in anguish. We were made with an ability to change and adapt to new circumstances. Above all our Creator God will not change. He will remain your anchor under all conditions.

I had one of these 'every days a school day' moments when I was studying 2 Corinthians 12 for a service which I was preparing where I am embarrassed to say despite having read this passage before I had never understood Paul had had glimpses of Heaven, a fact he kept to himself for 14 years. Paul never used this experience to build up his standing in this world but continued to be humble in his ministry to the Gentiles and boasted only of him who called him to this commission.

How I had never noted this important aspect of Paul's life before is a mystery, as Paul is an apostle I greatly admire, and how Paul could keep this experience to himself for such long time amazes me.

So as the children return to school, we remember the Christian education they will receive sadly not too often at school but through the brigades, JAM and Bible Class, we pray for all the staff involved in this important element of their well-being.

But we ourselves must seek to spend time in the study of God's word, as individuals or through group bible study to enable us to know God's ways are not the world's ways and we can therefore avoid being led astray.

Review of the Bridge Choir Concert, Broxburn Parish Church

4th and 5th June 2015

'Another op'nin, another show' from Kiss me Kate appropriately set the scene for the Bridge Choir's 2015 concert. How this choir has developed, both musically and in size - from a membership of 28 in 2009 to 50 in 2015. It's especially encouraging to see the wide range of ages in the choir, because in addition to the adult choir we also have the Bridge Choir Juniors (all girls, with the exception of one brave boy - come on you other boys!). They gave performances of songs from the musicals 'Annie' and 'The Sound of Music' and the hugely successful film 'Frozen' and remarkable choreography accompanied their lovely singing.

The senior Choir gave beautiful renditions of two contemplative songs, John Rutter's arrangement of the hymn 'For the beauty of the earth' and (ladies chorus) 'Wherever you are' made famous by the Military Wives Choir. The voices of two of the younger choir members Leah Heath and Debbie Mackin blended nicely in the duet 'For Good' from the musical Wicked. Compere Hugh Brown gave an interesting insight into many of the numbers, particularly 'I write the songs' where he explained that the 'I' in the song actually stands for God. What a difference this made when listening to the words.

The men of the choir really enjoyed themselves in the title song from 'Guys and Dolls'. A real highlight of the concert was 'Sisters' from the film White Christmas, performed by four pairs of real life sisters - Alison/Angela, Linda/Elaine, Janice/Gillian and Leah/Rachel. This was brilliant, but two extra 'sisters' broke in and tried to steal the show! They shall remain nameless, but for the curious their initials are RM and LW!

The able accompanist was Alan Hastie, apart from the Juniors who were accompanied by Moya Boonzaaier (good to see the recently arrived minister Jaco and his wife joining the Choir). The concert, which was superbly conducted by Alan Gilmour, ended with songs from the ever-popular Abba with the audience invited to join the choir and juniors in a final encore of 'Dancing Queen'. All in all, it was a very enjoyable evening - not least because of the obvious enthusiasm of everyone who took part. Roll on next year!

Shoe Box Appeal 2015 - Blythswood Care


It's not difficult to choose gifts for people who have so little. Things we take for granted can often be the luxuries for people living in desperate poverty. Suggested items to be handed in:

Thank you so much to everyone who helped in any way with our June visit. It was a truly wonderful visit, our best yet and it was a real pleasure to see the children progress throughout the month. Of course it was sad at the

end of the visit to say goodbye, especially to Dima, Denis, Tania and Veranika for the last time. These are children we have seen grow up over the past 5 visits and they go with our very best wishes and we hope that they remember their times with us in Broxburn and we know that we as a congregation of Gods people have been a positive influence on their young lives.

From 29th August to 25th September we will have a brand new group of twelve 7 and 8 year olds with us, from a brand new area in Belarus for us, for their very first visit to Scotland. They will be hosted a by a new group of host parents. With everything so new in this group we have had to work twice as hard to ensure that our new hosts are all well informed of what to expect. We do this because we want the children to have the best impression of Scotland and the people in this place who will look after them. Its very important for us that the children and host families settle quickly into a routine and feel comfortable in their surroundings and enjoy their time with us. I know that if you see any of the children in our church buildings or beyond you will say hello to them and be friendly towards them. This is very important in a land of strangers with a strange language where everything is so new for them.

You will definitely have the chance to see them at our midweek church service and soup lunch at midday on Wednesday 16th September and then again at our Thank you concert on Wednesday 23rd September at 6.30. It would be great to see you at any of these events. Please note the earlier than normal start time for the concert. If you speak with anyone who was at our thank you concert in June I am sure they would tell you it was great, and there wasn't a dry eye in the house. It was so humbling to see these children perform so beautifully.

This new group of children is a bold step for us to take and we have done everything to the very best of our abilities and everything is in place. These new children live in some of the worst conditions I have seen in all my times in Belarus. You may remember Jaco doing a live link from the church in Broxburn to me in Belarus in March. It was on that day that I met all of these children for the first time. I felt the power of your prayers that day as we made the choices of what children we would help. We need your prayer and support again as we continue with the next step on this new venture. Please pray that everything goes well with our arrangements for the visit, pray for the new host families and new children that they settle well and everyone feels the benefit of the children being with us.

This new group of children is from an area of Belarus never before visited by our charity. We are the first group to go there, but we are sure that God is guiding us.

Treasurer's Update

It's hard to believe that we're almost two-thirds of the way through this year – time seems to be flying past at an ever-increasing rate of knots. Time for a quick update on our finances:

As at the end of July our total income reached £54,126.73, with our expenditure over the same period being a bit higher at £63,713.49.

These income figures include the £2,027 settlement figure received from our insurance company for the claims made re our multiple roof thefts. The figures have also been boosted by almost £7,800 received to date in tax reclaims. These quarterly tax reclaims provide a very useful source of income, allowing us to reclaim tax on all gift aid contributions made, and on any gift day contributions which authorise us to reclaim gift aid. If anyone is interested in making gift aid contributions (whether via the weekly pink envelopes or via standing order) please speak to Jean Weir.

Also included in the income figures is the £1,563.39 balance transferred into our main account from the Elsie Lamont Bequest fund. That fund had previously been earmarked for the BUSY project but as we now donate £200 a month from our main account, we moved the money into the main account to help offset those donations. The monies raised for the various charities are also temporarily included within these income figures although not Church income as such (see below). The four special coffee bars (with craft stalls) held during the summer break themselves raised almost £1,400 for nominated charities thanks to your generosity.

On the expenses front, apart from the normal running expenses we had our final £2,835 bill for the roof repairs, and over £6,600 had to be spent to bring the manse up to an acceptable standard to satisfy Presbytery before our new minister could move in. We also passed on over £8,250 that had been raised for charities via soup lunches, coffee bars and retiring offerings.

All in all, our finances are still in a healthy position thanks to the contributions you continue to make. If anyone wants to start using weekly freewill offering (blue) envelopes or to sign-up for gift aid (pink) envelopes) please speak to Jean Weir.
