

Treasurer's Update - the times they are a-changing....

Those of a certain age (like me) will recognise the words of that Bob Dylan song. As I finalise our end-of-year accounts – my usual post-Christmas treat – I realise how true that has been of our Church activities in 2016! When pulling together all the information needed for the Trustee report and accounts I'm always surprised by how much has been achieved and the amount of work put in by the various committees working behind the scenes.

The new Social and Fundraising Group introduced some new events in 2016, the Easter Festival (remember those bacon rolls, mmm), the Flower Festival (the first in 28 years), a Christmas Fayre that had the Church and halls buzzing, and a Hogmanay ceilidh. These helped boost the coffers by over £4,200 – thanks to everyone involved. 2016 also saw us change the focus of our regular coffee bars and soup lunches to ensure the Church (our own charity) received a fairer share of monies raised in this way, while still raising money for other worthy charities. This has helped bring in another £3,300. Thanks again to all who helped in any way, and to those who come to sample the goodies on offer.

On a less positive note, 2016 also saw us having to make difficult decisions towards the end of the year as expenses ate into our reserves – and put a halt to all non-urgent maintenance work needing done. This hasn't made the work magically disappear but simply deferred it to another day! And as those of us of a certain age know, the older we get the more maintenance we need!

Another change which caused us more practical difficulties in 2016 was closure of our local RBS branch, resulting in us having to make the decision to move the Church working account to the local Bank of Scotland. The switch process itself took a lot of time and effort (almost 2 months) but the new account was finally in place by the end of September. Apart from a few teething problems, the switch process has worked

well but we're now nearing the end of the 6-month bank charge concession period. Unlike RBS, Bank of Scotland will impose bank charges, because our yearly turnover is more than £50,000. Once these kick-in, we'll be charged for every cheque we write or receive, and will be charged for cash we pay in (£1 per £100 on the first £1500, dropping to 80p per £100 on the balance – for every transaction). The only types of payment which don't incur charges are electronic payments eg payments by standing order or direct debit.

Against that background, can I ask you to think about making a change to the way you make your offering, and consider moving from donation envelopes to using a standing order? You can complete the standing order to pay in weekly (as with your envelopes, to help with your budgeting) or monthly or another frequency more suited to you. The money would then simply transfer electronically from your bank account to the church account, minimising bank charges.

In addition, if you are a tax payer, we could claim back 25% tax from HMRC **if** you are also willing to complete a gift aid declaration ie by continuing to donate the same amount but in a different way, you can help minimise bank charges **and** enable us to increase donations by 25%.

If you're interested in moving to a standing order and/or completing a gift aid declaration please speak to Jean Weir or myself.

On behalf of my late wife Lilian I would like to say a big thank you to all who contributed to the SOYA fund in 2016. In particular Janette Ewington and Helen Cunningham who continued to collect while Lilian was in hospital. This year a total of £953.00 was passed on on your behalf which consists of six full ASDA cards and fifty three pounds in cash along with the £36.00 bonus from ASDA.

This was a fantastic achievement.



From the first tentative offering of 12 small Christmas gifts about 10 years ago, our commitment has grown until now each young person on this Social Work Register - the numbers vary but are between 45 and 55 each year - receives a lovely personal gift, plus a full 3-course Christmas dinner (albeit from tins and packets!).

Through Social Work, we hear each year of the sincere gratitude and relief of the young people as they

receive food bags, but this is nothing compared to the incredible joy and emotion they show when they receive what is, for most of them, the only gift they ever receive.

Most of the youngsters are unable to write to convey their thanks

for our constant help - and indeed, to ensure their personal safety we do not have individual contact with them - but Social Work tell us how overwhelmed they themselves are when they receive so much from us.

Since Lilian started with this project in 2009 with the members of the Guild almost £5000 has been raised. I felt so honoured when asked by so many members of the



congregation if I intended to continue with this project, and since December I have had a great response. If you think that this is something you would like to contribute to at £1.00 per month or if you wish to pay a full year up front then have a chat with Janette or myself.
