Dear friends

As a family we feel blessed to be part of the next chapter of the Broxburn Parish Church story. It is indeed a privilege to be part of this faith community. We are looking forward to this faith journey with each and every one of you.

Worship answers the question about why we (Christians) are here. While we can probably venture any number of answers I am convinced that we are here to serve God and glorify his name; something we collective call worship. Everything else takes a back seat to this.

Secondly we have the ship called FELLOWSHIP. We are called to love God above all else and second to that our neighbours as ourselves. By reaching out in friendship and seeking opportunities to share in fellowship we get the fellowship on its merry way.

Obviously, fellowship also extends to the strangers and visitors. Matter of fact since the earliest days of the Christian faith two characteristics made Christians different from all other faith communities: their fellowship with one another and their fellowship and hospitality to strangers.

Thirdly, we have the STEWARDSHIP. Stewardship is to be understood in a much wider sense than only matters pertaining to money. Stewardship in essence involves sharing and giving back out of the riches of my belongings (donations and contributions), my talents and abilities (lending a hand with projects), my time (volunteering), and everything else that I often take for granted. Stewardship therefore also involves sharing the Good News about Jesus Christ (evangelism, outreach and mission).

May I invite you to reflect on the three ships and if you feel like it stop me after church or give me a phone to discuss or interrogate it. I'm looking forward to share the journey aboard the three ships with you.

May I share a blessing from Max Lucado¹ with you in closing:

May the God of peace and grace and truth be your guide as you begin your day. May he go ahead of you and prepare the way. May he come behind you and protect you. May he surround you and make you aware of his presence.

FOCC

At Christmas time all of the children on our programme received a large food parcel and a present from us, delivered to them by our great

interpreters. They were all in good health and good spirits despite the harsh winter weather.

We are now in the process of making our final preparations for our 10 day trip to Belarus on 19th March. Feeling a bit like Santa Claus, making a list and checking it twice for all the letters and supplies we will take but luckily we don't have to decide who's been bad or good, naughty or nice. We don't go there to judge, we accept the children and families as we find them and we go only to love and help.

On this trip will be Kenny Turnbull (6th visit) and Bob Pattison(2nd visit) from our congregation and another host parent Adela Keenan (3rd visit). Our visit in October was a very exciting one for us as we found the 7 new children we needed to restore our May/June group to 20 children again after saying goodbye last year to some children for the last time in terms of their visits to Scotland, as they had completed their period with us on our programme.

Our visit in March will be even more exciting as we have taken a huge leap of faith and decided to invite a second group of children. So we will have 20 children with us, as normal, in May/June and a further 12 new children in September. We have been working away very hard in the background and have 12 new host families in place who have all been through the necessary checks with the authorities. So on this visit as well as visiting all 20 children in the May/June group and taking them food parcels,

essentials and letters from their host families and finding out how they are getting on and reporting back, we will be looking for 12 new children to join us in September.

For the 12 new children we choose I am sure it will feel like Christmas as the girls will get a gift of a doll with many outfits, the boys will get a gift of a football and pump, quite possibly the first new toys they will have received at the age of 7. More important than that they will receive much needed vitamin tablets to help their health and the gift of hope for the future as they will be coming on month long respite visits to Scotland for the next 3-5 years. They will also receive the gift of a second family who will love and care for them when they are in Scotland.

The new families have all provided us with a letter and pictures telling their new child all about them. This is very important for the child and their family in Belarus as they know that the child will be going to a nice loving family that they know something about, so its not so much of a journey into the unknown.

So please think about us between 19-29 March and pray for us, that we will be kept safe, we will be able to meet all of our existing children, we will be able to find 12 new very needy children and as our decisions on new children are life changing decisions, please pray that we will make the correct decisions. Thank you all for your prayerful and financial support. It is very much appreciated.

Friends of Chernobyl's Children, West Lothian Group



Over the last year the BUSY Project has worked with 254 young people aged 10-18. Boys and girls, some of whom are disadvantaged or from low income families, have engaged

with BUSY Project activities. The Project works with young people who have a church or no church background. The BUSY Project is a youth ministry reaching out to our young people

Our group work programmes have grown to include one breakfast club, and three activity groups, leading to weekly work with 29 young people.

6 young people have participated in Seasons for Growth, with a further 10 on a waiting list.

75 listening sessions were delivered to 33 young people by a team of 5 trained listeners.

In the past year, we have worked with 27 young people through our engagement programme, offering additional support for them to access project activities.

We have a further 20 young people who have been referred to our resilience focussed group work programmes, and we are in the process of establishing a further group, and setting up a waiting list to help meet these needs.

Weekly Youth Club sessions were delivered for 10-26 young people (average attendance of 16 young people)

Weekly Drop-in sessions were delivered for 2-15 young people (average attendance of 8 at each)

Monthly Youth Event ('Chill') was delivered for 3-23 young people in Broxburn (average attendance of 14)

A second event, created with our Young leaders ('The Mine') is now running weekly, with 13-37 young people attending weekly (average 22).

We have now extended this event into an online Minecraft world where young people can meet, create and play, with appropriate supervision.

18 young people were provided placements as Young Leaders across 7 Project Activities, including mentoring and training.

28 young people are registering hours towards Saltire Awards.

41 young people took part in Leadership Development Workshops this year.

We delivered our first structured Young Leaders training course / induction.

Project Romania will see 12 young people raising funds and working with young people in Romania.

The Busy Project has developed into a fantastic, vibrant, life changing project, reaching out to many hundreds of young people in our community over the past 10 years.

Gordon Rouse as our youth development worker has driven the project forward ably assisted by Hannah our part time youth worker and Lynne our administrator; and of course a team of very enthusiastic and able volunteers comprising young leaders and older young leaders!

Local people between the 3 churches fund one third of the work of the Busy project, which is very much appreciated. If 120 more people (only 40 from each church) gave £20.00 monthly we could be self-sufficient, that would be our best wish.

Over the past 3 years the gap was covered by the Gannochy and Robertson Trust funds they are coming to an end and we need more funds to continue – Now! We have applications to external trust funds underway, but at this time things are very difficult.

We are prayerfully moving forward with hope, and will continue as much of this great work as possible.

Using the strengths we have as a project; great staff, young people and volunteers;

We trust God has a plan and we put our faith in him to deliver us our future.

The Foodbank

By now the foodbank will have moved from the Baptist church to ours. Luckily many of the volunteers from other churches are willing to continue serving from our premises. Indeed Frank Murray and his wife Christine were happy to continue on Tuesdays even though they have moved to Kirkcaldy.

Our customers are men and women and their children who, through no fault of their own have found themselves in frightening circumstances unable to provide for themselves or their families. Our task is merely to open the appropriately sized box, check the contents, top up what may also be needed (sometimes adding baby nappies, sanitary products, dog food or toiletries etc) then to pack it all in carrier bags. We can only serve those who produce a voucher issued by one of the many agencies who can do so, such as the Job Centre, Council Information Service at Strathbrock Partnership, Open Door etc. People who arrive without a voucher are directed to the most suitable voucher issuing location. We supply breakfasts, lunches and dinners sufficient to last 3 days by which time their situation may have improved by obtaining employment or receiving help from the authorities.

The people who come in are welcomed with a smile and offered refreshments while one of the team sits with them for a chat to put them at ease, listening to any tales they wish to tell. Some arrive embarrassed and/or distressed, so by treating them with respect and sympathy, by the time their food has been sorted out and they've had a cuppa they are normally much more relaxed and optimistic. Volunteers are often moved by the genuine gratitude expressed by the customers.

It is often fairly quiet and the group can then enjoy good conversation over cups of tea. There are also busy periods when time flies and we feel this is a good opportunity for outreach by the church as we try to follow our Saviour's example of serving our neighbours. There are likely to be fewer staff available in the opening weeks at the new venue so it is hoped that many will see the benefits of sustaining the foodbank until (hopefully) the need for it ends. Thus we ask for more help from our own congregation. Volunteers can find a task suited to their preferences and abilities, either handling the boxes, filling the bags, completing the paperwork, making tea, coffee or soup or liaising with the Trussell Trust under whose Christian umbrella we operate. There are 8 outlets in West Lothian of which ours is believed to be the busiest!

We are open from 12.30 till 2.30 pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays so volunteers can opt for which day suits best. If we get sufficient numbers (as we had before moving) it can mean doing foodbank duty on only one day in three weeks. Not too much to expect of anyone don't you think?
