A church built to last

Broxburn Parish Church sits in the heart of the community it serves and has been here for well over **100** years.

Over that time we've seen many changes and many challenges, as we look to maintain and grow our congregation and our links with the wider community.

Family, friendship and fellowship are our key values and we extend a warm welcome to everyone who visits our church, joins us for worship or uses our halls throughout the week.

We want our church to continue to grow and develop to meet the changing needs of our community, and invite you to play your part in helping achieve this.

Our stewardship programme aims to encourage all our members to review their giving to the church and help make sure that the church will still be here in another **100** years. We hope you will say...

Count me in!

Why should I give?

The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. (**2 Corinthians 9:6-7**)

Anything you give, whether large or small, will be appreciated and will help us continue to spread the word of God throughout the community.

Why does it always come down to money?

Broxburn Parish Church was built in **1879**. In today's world, keeping this lovely old building wind and watertight, and in good repair, doesn't come cheap. The theft of lead from our roof three times in the last few years - and the resultant damage caused - bit heavily into our reserves.

To keep the church and halls at a comfortable temperature for all our visitors needs a good heating system and controls, plus regular maintenance checks. Heating and lighting costs alone have increased by more than **25%** in recent years.

How many of us can say that we've increased our giving by the same percentage over the same timescale?

We have **350** members on our congregational roll and average around **110** attendees at our Sunday worship services.

We recognise that work and family commitments, and illness, can prevent members from coming along every week but if you haven't joined us for a while we'd love to welcome you back.

We welcome those who are single, married, divorced, widowed, gay, confused, comfortable, rich or poor. We extend a special welcome to wailing babies and excitable toddlers and offer a crèche during the service.

Can't we cut down on expenditure?

Sadly, having reviewed our predicted expenses, there's nothing we can really cut out. Building maintenance costs take a fair chunk of our budget every year and deferral of essential work simply defers, and increases, the cost when the work is finally done. Then there are heating and lighting costs, insurance, licences, telephone, council tax, photocopying/printing costs and our Ministry and Mission fees and presbytery dues.

Our budget forecasts for the last two years have shown a consistent shortfall in income over expenses of around **£18,000** a year, without allowing for any special projects. If this trend continues, then the church will run out of money in three or four years time - or sooner, if unexpected expenses hit us.

The other side of the financial balance is income, and that's where we recognise the problem lies. If every member



contributes an extra **£2** a week – less than half the price of a pensioner fish supper – that would increase our direct giving by **£36,400** a year! However, we know that not all members

contribute to the church so we are all being encouraged to review our giving.

Sharing fellowship

The congregation of Broxburn Parish Church are ordinary people united in faith in Jesus Christ. We provide the services expected of the local church, from weekly Sunday services, midweek services, celebration of communion four times a year during our normal Sunday services plus monthly evening communion and regular services in sheltered housing and nursing homes.

We also have a Pastoral Care team who visit the sick and frail whether at home or in hospital, and whether they are members of our church or not. And then there are the regular coffee bars on a Saturday morning, the monthly soup lunches, and the various groups associated with the church.

Outreach in the community

Broxburn Parish Church reaches out to the local community in a variety of ways, from members' involvement in other charities like Friends of Chernobyl's Children (FOCC) and BUSY, to volunteering and supporting West Lothian Foodbank.

Our halls are also used regularly by other local groups, playgroups and various after-school clubs.

What does the future hold?

That may very much depend on you. As you can see from the previous page, we can't afford to continue as we are.

We want our Church to continue to grow and develop and serve the needs of the community for at least the next **100** years. To make sure that happens we need to increase our regular income. **Can we count you in?**

How can I give?

Regular giving helps us plan our budgeted expenditure, and you can make regular contributions via donation envelopes or via a standing order placed with your bank.



If you use envelopes we now incur bank charges when we pay the cash or cheque into the bank (**25p** for every cheque we receive or write and **£1 per £100** cash on the first **£1,500**, dropping to **80p per £100** – for every transaction).

The bank doesn't impose charges on us for donations made via standing order. You can complete the standing order to pay in weekly to help with your budgeting (as with donation envelopes), or monthly or another frequency more suited to you. Donations made in this way will continue until you cancel the standing order, whether you are able to join us for worship or not.

If you are a tax payer you can help increase your contribution further by also completing a gift aid declaration. This then allows us to claim back **25%** tax from HMRC.

So, a **£2** contribution made in this way would be worth **£2.50** to us, and if paid via standing order, would be **free** of bank charges.

When you join us for worship, why not throw any loose change in your pocket into the open plate? We can also claim back **25%** tax on any small donations made in this way from HMRC, whether you are a tax payer or not.

One-off donations can be made at any time and can also, if you are a tax-payer, be gift-aided, allowing us to reclaim **25%** tax from HMRC.

You'll find further information about gift aid and a blank standing order in the magazine. Any gift aid declaration must be returned to Jean Weir, our gift aid convenor, either direct or via your elder. You should hand in the completed Standing Order form to your bank.

From the Manse

It is hard to believe that we are already half way through the year!

You may be packing for your cruise just now. Maybe you are preparing for a short break or maybe not planning to be on leave at all. Whatever the situation thanks for taking the time to read this.

Apart from the normal contributions the current edition of the magazine is themed around stewardship. You may remember

at my induction I mentioned that church is about three ships: worship, fellowship and stewardship. While we continue to seek more ways to address the former two 'ships' we have not really addressed stewardship. In a nutshell stewardship is our awareness that we have a responsibility to consume and utilise our resources in line with our confession that we are Christians.

In practical terms that mean that we consider how we spend / deploy / use our money, our time, and our talents. In the Church of Scotland we cycle through the three focus areas of money, time and talents over three year periods. We start later this year (end of September / beginning of October) with a stewardship campaign starting with money. Why money again? Well, I am sure you will find the answers to this question in several places of this magazine.

May I add two comments to what you will find elsewhere in the magazine? Firstly, allow me to thank each and everyone who is contributing to the church. It is nothing short of humbling seeing time and time again the open hearts and open hands after an appeal.

Secondly, the purpose of stewardship is to get more people to contribute regularly rather than to persuade people already contributing to increase their giving. (If giving can be increased obviously, it will be received with gratitude!). Stewardship is thus more than a once off appeal for a project. The idea is to increase the general income of the church in general. To this end standing orders and gift-aid declarations also greatly aid. Finally, if you need to have a word on the matter of money or just in general please do not hesitate to contact me or Sue Sneddon, our treasurer.

In closing, may I wish you a happy summer – whether that means holidays or work! I am positive that we shall have lots of sunshine... it may not be this year, though.

FOCC

We had a very successful visit to Belarus in March. We visited all 12 children in our August group and the 5 new children in our June group taking them all food parcels, medical supplies and love from their hosts in the form of a letter.

We gathered together all of our 2 groups of children (33 plus some parent helpers) for a meal and party at 10 pin bowling. It was great to see them all together having great fun and enjoying a good meal. We also visited 2 orphanages. The first one we took hundreds of pairs of new pants, socks, vests and tights. Imagine the luxury of getting new



pants etc for the first time. These were very well received. The second orphanage was for special needs children. We took them much needed learning games and the children had great fun exploring them, as did we :)

We also helped mum and little brother of Ercamo and Zarina get to hospital. Little brother Sasha has cancer and has since had a large tumour removed and has had 2 lots of chemotherapy. So sad. He is not even one year old yet. We have now provided special medicine to stop him being sick and we will provide transport for all of his visits to hospital which is about 3 hours away. We have also helped a boy called Alexei. He was run over by a lorry during an outdoor art class. He broke almost every

bone in his body and nobody has taken responsibility for his recovery. So after coming out of hospital he is an invalid and he is left with his mum with no support. We have provided food and will visit him on our next visit and perhaps in the future if he recovers enough we will bring him for a visit to Scotland.

We also visited 2 schools, spending time encouraging the pupils in the English lessons. We also visited older children who are finished on our programme - Dima, Dianna and many peoples favourite in the church, wee Denis, who is not so wee now. He is growing up quickly. Jean Turnbull did very well on her first visit. She worked very hard and kept us all entertained.

Once all the work was done one day, Jean held a wee coffee meeting for all the interpreters who have stayed with her and others too. It was great to see them all together having a catch up and a blether.

Our June group of 21 children will be with us from 27 May to 24 June. A very exciting first visit for our 5 new children. They will all be based in our halls on



weekdays so you may see them around. We will be taking the Wednesday service on 21 June so please join us and encourage the children, who will take part, and share a soup lunch with us. Later that day at 6.30pm will be the childrens "Thank you" concert. Its normally very entertaining and very humbling. Please come along. Everyone is very welcome. Entry is free.

Thank you to everyone for your continued support and interest in what we do. It is very much appreciated.

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Busy Project

Hi folks!

I just wanted to share some lovely moments we've had recently.

About a year ago I was praying for BUSY and asked God that one day a teenager would come up to me and show some evidence of them reading the Bible in their own private time.

Last week, I was sitting with a lad who has been with us for three years, who was first referred to us by the Academy for being behaviourally difficult and bullied and under confident. This lad is now a Christian, and a young leader in the project, and he's currently leading a discussion table in our Youth Alpha. Sure, he's not perfect, but he has come a long way. Well, last week he and I were sitting discussing how to lead discussions well and he said, 'oh, yeah, it's like what Jesus does in Matthew 20:19.'

And my mouth dropped open. And I ran to the bible to check it, and sure enough, he'd just quoted chapter and verse on the money! That evening his dad texted me to thank me for how much more courage his son now has.

The Alpha Course is three weeks in and going well. We've had around 10-12 young people. There's a few younger lads who don't seem to understand the topics, but they do understand that BUSY is a place for them, where they fit in and are included. And if they're not yet understanding who Jesus is in their heads, they're beginning to understand what it's like to encounter him in kindness.

Please keep praying for us. Pray for me too, that God keeps showing me ways to connect with the young people in meaningful ways.

Foodbank

The Foodbank continues to operate from the church hall every Tuesday and Thursday from 12:30 until 2:30.There are now 10 Foodbanks in West Lothian. The most recent openings were one in Armadale in April and in Craigshill last month.

In 2016 in West Lothian, 3559 people in crisis received a 3 day emergency supply of food. Broxburn is one of the busiest Foodbanks in the area. We have recently seen an increase of people coming to us who are homeless and may either be "sofa surfing" or in one room temporary accommodation. These people have often limited or no access to cooking facilities. If so we provide them with "kettle boxes" which contain food which needs either no cooking or just boiling water to be added.

Local bakers Heskeths, in West Main Street, now donate to us left over bread and bakery products. This is great, because most of what we distribute has to be processed and tinned food – not fresh.

We really appreciate the support from within our own church. This includes use of premises, with heating and lighting, financial support through for example retiring offerings, and the donations, volunteers and support from members and church groups. The monetary donations are required for admin and transport costs. We intend to hold a coffee bar with various stalls in mid July (date to be confirmed).

We could not do what we do without the support and donations we receive, as all food given out in West Lothian through the Foodbank is donated locally.

Thank you and may God bless you as you continue to support the Foodbank through your prayers and generous giving.




Recording of Sermons
