Prayer Corner

Earlier this week I started a new set of passages in my daily bible readings. Normally the daily readings consist of a short introduction to focus ones mind, then you are asked to read a few verses of scripture, then there is a short message relevant to Christian living today.

But at the start of this series you were asked, if you could find the time, to read a full six chapters from the Old Testament from the prophet Isaiah, chapters 40-45.

They suggested the reading should take about thirty minutes, and to me this is the best thirty minutes I have spent for a long, long time.

We as I have mentioned before living in very difficult times for the Christian faith and possibly for you and I as individuals and it is good to be reminded of what God has and continues to do for those who love Him.

This passage from Isaiah was written to God's people in exile and many were asking where was God in this their times of despair. Had God left them as they had gone their own way and had not lived lives pleasing to Him despite God's pleading for them to turn for their sinful ways.

Have you and I forgotten what God really means to us as Christians, as the church and as individuals in this world today. This is possibly the right time to be reminded of these key truths when.

As we approach Christmas we are reminded of God's gift to this world of His son Jesus. A gift that has the power to change lives, change families and transform communities but for this change to happen we must be reminded of what God means for us today and what He longs for each and everyone of us.

Please, take time to read these passages, I am sure, like me, your heart will rejoice at all He has done and promises to do for all we believe and allow Him to work in our daily lives.



Rose Window Award

Our Rose Window was honoured with a commendation in the 2011 Saltire Society Awards which celebrate good design of all forms from buildings to sculptures. Emma Butler-Cole Aiken, who designed the window, explains the background to the window's creation.

It is a real honour both for me, and for you as a church, that the rose window has received a Commendation from the Saltire Society. It is a recognition of good art in an appropriate setting and affirmation that all the hard work was worth it.

I have to admit that the designing and making of the window was not without difficulty. Sometimes I was frustrated by the difficulty of communicating what I had in mind, and had to work harder at how to present a drawing on paper to portray what the window could look like. One breakthrough was to photograph the drawing and present it on a laptop as the light of the screen made it glow more like stained glass. Another breakthrough was the suggestion by a member of the group to turn the dove to fly sideways (as opposed to downwards). This was hard for me to accept at first, and it required considerable reworking of the design - but the result works beautifully.

Then there were the delays caused by repairs to the stonework taking longer than planned and unexpected extra work resulting from that. And finally the injury to Joab, who installed the window with me, meaning he was unable to finish the work. Bob kindly stepped in and all was completed successfully.

Friends of Chernobyl's Children

From 14th September to 12th October we hosted the second annual visit of the West Lothian group with 3 new faces increasing the number of young children in the group to 17. Accompanying them this year was Katia the interpreter, again, and Luda the teacher for the first time. They are a great group of children. Well behaved and its hard to comprehend how they can be so happy and positive when you consider the conditions they live in at home.

The children come from some of the areas of Belarus badly affected by the radiation from Chernobyl, which is still harming people 25 years on and it will be 24000 years before the ground is clear again. As well as putting up with the health problems caused by the radiation, inflation running at 300%, living in wooden houses with no running water and an outside toilet, the children in our programme also come from some very difficult family situations.

We have seen many of the children return to us this year a lot thinner than they were when they left us last year. This is a reflection on the difficult economic situation at home where they are having to chose whether to eat or not on some days. As a result they need our help more than ever.

They come here for respite from the terrible conditions at home and live with host families mainly in the West Lothian area. Six

of the host families are members of our church. When the children are here they get a month of love and care which includes dental, optical and health checks and as much healthy Scottish food as we can give them. They meet each week day in our church halls for schooling and a full



programme of healthy activities and excursions to interesting and fun places.

The children arrive with a spare pair of pants and a toothbrush and go home with a full 25kg suitcase packed with warm clothes, toys and vitamins for the year. Most importantly they go home with a boosted immune system, many happy memories, hope for the future and knowing that the people of Scotland love them and care for them.

The 2011 visit was a great success and thank you to everyone in the congregation who contributed in whatever way to make this a brilliant visit for 17 very special young people.

Please remember the work of this charity and the families of the children in our group in your prayers. These are very difficult times for them.

An excerpt from a recent BB E-bulletin:

"You may have read that Barnado's, one of the BB charity partners, has recently

published the results of Research which reveals that the public holds a negative view of all children, despite the majority being well behaved, attending school, taking part in activities and a significant number contributing to their communities and volunteering. The findings show:

49% of the UK population agree that children today are beginning to behave like animals.

44% agree that children in this country are becoming feral

47% agree that the trouble with young people is that they're angry, violent and abusive.

25% of people think that children who behave badly or anti-socially are beyond help by the age of 10.

More people disagreed with the statement that children who get into trouble are in need of help (38%) than agreed (36%).

I was shocked and disappointed to read these statistics. What do think? Do you agree or disagree with them? Personally, I disagree and even if they are a true reflection of current society then what can we do about it? The BB and the GB may not guide as many young adults into the church as might be liked but we do provide engaging, exciting and challenging activities which keep at least some of the kids off the street that might otherwise go wandering as well as cater for those kids who would never wander the streets.

As an example, the BB Junior Section recently took 8 boys to the Battalion Indoor 5s and Handball competition. Where an afternoon of sports was enjoyed, all in a friendly, competitive, Christian atmosphere. During the rest of November the Anchor Boys entered a Battalion Colouring-In competition and the Company Section and Seniors will compete in the Battalion Badminton competitions. Our Christmas nights out have been booked and the New Year will see us studying several passages of the Bible for reflection and a regional quiz. Of course, not forgetting we have 4 young men working hard to gain their Queen's Badge, the highest award in the BB. Maybe our numbers are lower than they might be but we have to start somewhere and hopefully spread the Good News of the Gospel out to a larger number of young people.

Mission Partner News



Former local couple celebrate 70 years of marriage

Nettie & Billy Little were married on 24th October 1941 whilst Billy was on three days leave from the army. 70 years on they celebrated with family and friends at the St Anne's Care Home in Musselburgh where they now live. They met whilst teenagers as members of Tranent cycling club. Billy was serving in the Kings Own Scottish Borderers in India when he proposed to her and she set about arranging the wedding at Tranent Town Hall when he would return to East Lothian.

After he left the army in 1946, Billy set up a furniture shop in East Main Street - Wilson & Little – before moving across the street to run a newsagent shop of the same name. In the mid 1980s the couple returned to East Lothian, living in Longniddry, Tranent and Elphinstone before their move to Musselburgh.

The celebrations included Deputy Lord Lieutenant Jeremy Nichols presenting them with telegrams on behalf of the Queen and East Lothian Provost as well as flowers from staff and residents.



It is with sadness we learn that Billy fell shortly after this and died on the morning of Friday 28th October.
