

Prayer Corner

We are living in times of great uncertainty. As a national Church we have too few ministers to fill parishes up and down the land and there is no evidence that things will improve soon. Difficult decisions need to be made to address the current situation as it is not sustainable with the status quo.



On top of this, negotiations to exit the European Union have not gone well. There is little unity in Parliament, even political parties are divided on opinions to the best way forward. It appears there is to much 'me' and not enough 'us'. Meanwhile people are concerned about their medication, much of it from Europe, to their holidays in Europe, and industry and commerce uncertain about tariffs, movement of goods and employment of European workers. As our Government is focussed on Brexit we see a widening of the gap between rich and poor, poverty on the increase amongst children and the elderly. Food Banks have seen increasing numbers with Universal Credit rolling out.

Yes, the picture at times does not look rosy, but we must hold on tight and trust God in every circumstance. Our God has never failed us in the past but we need to be his hands, feet and mouth in these times. Great if His faithfulness! Amen.

Our minister Jaco and our office bearers that God will give them wisdom in decisions about our congregation.

Our Queen and her Government in Westminster as they pursue an acceptable exit from the European Union before the cut off on 29th March.

The Church of Scotland in this time of crisis with a significant shortfall in parish ministers.

Congregations in vacancy that they might work together to maintain God's work and love in their parishes.

The vulnerable in our communities that they will be provided for, and remember the work of the Food Banks.

Social and Fundraising





West Lothian Food Bank

As many of you will be aware, the distribution centre in Broxburn for the West Lothian Food Bank is in our Church hall. We are open every week on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 12.30 until 2.30pm. Sadly 2018 has been our busiest year to date. In Broxburn alone we provided food to 416 adults and 154 children during 2018. If we look back to January 2018, we gave food to 29 adults and 12 children. In January 2019 the figures were 59 adults and 16 children - an alarming increase of 83%.

The food we give out is donated by local people. You'll remember we had the Food Bank Christmas tree in the church in December. People donated generously. We had 27 crates of food that week to be picked up from Broxburn Parish Church, which had been handed in by our congregation, local people and businesses as well as nearly £500 cash. During the week before Christmas, as well as the usual teas and coffees, clients sat down to a mini Christmas lunch of homemade soup, Christmas pudding and trifle, with Jim and Moya providing background music on the piano and fiddle.



All clients come with a voucher, issued by a range of different agencies, which entitles them to food for three days. We are also able to supply some toiletries and cleaning products, pet food, nappies and baby food. We have 'kettle boxes' for people who don't have access to cooking facilities. Our team of volunteers welcome clients, and spend time chatting to them over a cup of tea and a sandwich. Having no food is almost always a symptom of other issues, so we also look to provide information about other agencies who can provide them with additional support to help them get their lives back on track.

They appreciate being somewhere warm and welcoming, and having someone to spend time with them.

Many people who we see never imagined that they would have to come to a Food Bank. They will tell us about how not very long ago, they were in work, with a secure income, somewhere to live. As a result of a crisis like losing their job, their world is turned upsides down. It's not unusual to have an adult in who hasn't eaten for three days. They will go without, but it's not being able to feed their children or their pet that is their tipping point.

It's the generosity of people donating food, money, or volunteering their time, that enables us to run the Food Bank. If you are interested in volunteering or just finding out a bit more, Anne Gunn or Evelyn McCreight would be happy to speak to you. Please also remember those who come to the Food Bank and our dedicated team of volunteers in your prayers.
