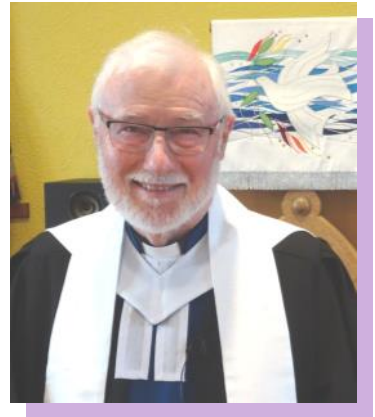
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# From the Interim Moderator

## Rev. Derek R. Henderson



When I was asked to write this article and started to think about it, I realised that Broxburn had featured in my life in a number of ways. As some of you may recall, on my first Sunday with you, I showed a picture of me with my great-grandmother taken in the early 1950s at her home, which used to stand opposite the church. To my amazement, it transpired that she was also the great-grandmother of a member of the congregation!

My next contact with Broxburn was during my tenure as an elder trainer when I did a series of training sessions with the Kirk Session.

I first felt the call to ministry at the General Assembly of 2010 but it took a little time before I was sure enough to put my name forward for consideration. And then, in 2013, I came to Broxburn once again to explore my sense of calling with your former minister, Rev. Terry Taylor. After completing my university studies, I was ordained to the ministry in September 2017, on the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of my ordination as an elder, in St Michael's Parish Church, Linlithgow, which is my home church and also my wife's.

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I am married to Margaret and we have two daughters, both of whom are married and each have two boys.

Whilst my role as Interim Moderator is to chair meetings of the Kirk Session, Congregational Board and of the congregation, I think that it is important to be with you as often as I can and as my duties as Ordained Local Minister at Abercorn linked with Pardovan, Kingscavil and Winchburgh allow. The guidance given to Interim Moderators makes it clear that it is the task of the Kirk Session and Interim Moderator to lead the congregation in this period of transition.

It must not be forgotten that the ongoing life and witness of the congregation continues. We often speak of a 'vacant congregation', but nothing could be further from the truth: there may be a ministry vacancy but the life of God's people continues, as do the responsibilities of the Kirk Session. A vacancy can be a disconcerting time in the life of a congregation - there may well be uncertainty, or indeed apprehension, as the congregation contemplates the future in a time of change. However, it is also a time for reflection, prayer, growth and opportunity if used well.

Both Margaret and I have been made to feel very welcome in the short time that we have been with you. It is my prayer that we can move forward together, facing the future positively, as we seek to follow God's will for his kingdom in this place.

The kitchen was wholly funded from Legacy monies left to our church by the late Wilma Beveridge. It will therefore be called 'The Beveridge Room', and a plaque will be put on the kitchen door. Those who knew Wilma well are sure she would have loved that!

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## Food Bank

Thank you to everyone who supported the Reverse Advent Calendar appeal. Over 50 boxes and bags, filled by people from our congregation as well as local people, businesses and organisations, were sent to the warehouse from Broxburn. These were distributed to people in need in West Lothian to make their Christmas days a bit more special.

Over West Lothian as a whole there was on average one metric tonne of food donated for every day in December which is absolutely phenomenal!

People who came to the Food Bank on Christmas Eve were all given a Christmas lunch with home-made soup, Christmas pudding and trifle, as well as teas coffees and sweet treats. That was very well received. At Hogmanay we tried something new, offering a stovies lunch.

After a slow start, January saw a marked increase in the number of people needing help - for many (and often complex) reasons. They appreciate the food, the opportunity for a chat over a hot drink and a sandwich plus the advice we can give them about other organisations which can help them.

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## The Edinburgh Passion: A 2020 Vision

For several years the Princes Street Easter Play has taken place on the Saturday of Easter weekend. Our own Sandra Stirling and Sally North have taken part. The Easter Play aims to bring Christ to the centre of the city at Easter and has been viewed by thousands; believers, non-believers, tourists, rugby fans - in fact anyone in Princes Street Gardens at the time.

This year a new city-wide venture is taking place. The Easter Story is being told in real time starting with The Last Supper on Thursday 9<sup>th</sup> April, staged in homeless groups and in Dine, above the Traverse Theatre, leading on to the betrayal and trial, the death of Judas set in a nightclub. On Friday 10<sup>th</sup> is a modern day trial involving lawyers followed by the crucifixion. On Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> the Princes Street Easter Play Trust is presenting 'The Darkest Day' in the Gardens at 2pm, the time when Jesus was in the tomb, a time of despair, grief, reflection and hope. Later, members of Edinburgh Peoples Theatre will portray the women who followed Jesus. On Easter Sunday Jesus will appear to his disciples on the shores of Duddingston Loch at 7am. Then he will give his last commission at Easter Road stadium at 8am.

Various venues are being used, including the Scottish Parliament, a nightclub, a police box and Easter Road stadium. There are creative ways of telling the story - photography, dance, music, drama and social media. The Passion is seeking to break the Easter Story out of our church buildings (where it is often left to stagnate) and share it with the ordinary people to whom its truth is vital.

Some venues will be ticketed because of limited space, but the Princess Street play is free and easily reached by bus from Broxburn. Come along and bring a friend!

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## Treasurer's Update

I've just finished my usual 'post-Christmas-treat', pulling together all the figures and information needed to prepare our end-of-year accounts. This always helps reinforce all the hard work that goes on behind the scenes by the various committees and working groups. Despite a year in which we've seen significant changes, I am continually heartened by the number of people who are willing to give so generously of their time and talents to help our church continue to prosper.

As we started to catch up on the work we'd previously had to put on hold during the Presbytery Planning Review, we shouldn't be surprised to hear that expenditure outstripped income last year by approximately £10,000. However, thanks to a generous legacy we were left a few years ago we have, as planned, dug into our reserves to help fund installation of our new kitchen, something which we fully expect to pay dividends in the longer term. Fundraising efforts in 2019 raised over £5,600 thanks to the monthly coffee bars, regular Sunday teas, afternoon tea events, soup and sweet lunches after Sunday worship, reinstatement of the monthly mid-week soup lunches and another successful Christmas Fayre. In addition we raised almost £3,500 for various charities.

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Our finances are still in a healthy state thanks to your continued support via regular contributions. We currently have 46 standing orders in place, 35 of which are also gift-aided. Most of the standing orders are set up on a monthly basis, with 4 on a weekly basis and 3 on a yearly basis. Being able to rely on regular contributions in this way makes it easier to plan expenditure and helps minimise the bank charges we incur whenever we bank cash.

2020 will no doubt bring us different challenges as we move forward and your continued financial support is very much appreciated. If you are interested in moving to standing order and/or to gift-aid your donations, please speak to myself, or Jean Weir, or your elder. Thank you.
